African "Safari"

Many beds, bumpy journeys, three hour bogs, lots of hours in the sky plus, the privilege of meeting God's people across Australia and within Africa! Since September I have been in Perth for meetings and speaking at Trinity College; Sydney for fund raising, wonderfully organised by Friends of the Outback; Cambridge Park with my family as my step-mother died; back to Perth for our Fellow Workers' Conference; then after one night at home, on a plane bound for Uganda and Kenya; after three weeks in Africa I next found myself in a small mining town in the Pilbara -Paraburdoo. As I write this I have just returned from an encouraging week with the Alexanders in Kununurra, the furthest parish from us southerners in Geraldton.

I am so thankful to God for his care and protection, as Psalm 146:8f reminds us:

> The LORD is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and rich in love.

The LORD is good to all; he has compassion on all he has made.

As Murray Wilding and I set off for Africa we weren't exactly sure what was in store for us, yet knowing

God is sovereign enabled us to trust in his overseeing hand. We in the North West established a link with the diocese of Karamoja in

Uganda – a region with limited resources and great need. Murray used his engineering skills to bring running water to the diocesan centre and church houses in Moroto. Though it was frustrating at times due to difficulties of accessing replacement parts and new electricity lines, it was very satisfying to see people opening a tap for their water instead of walking a considerable distance to fill up jerry cans.

While Murray was working at Moroto I taught trainee church workers at their centre in Lotome. I also visited St Andrews secondary school where our diocese supports some 200 students. The churches I was privileged to speak at drew hundreds to their services - the singing was terrific and the eager faces peering through the windows and doors (since everyone couldn't fit inside) created an amazing atmosphere to preach in. But the church lacks pastors to teach and care for the many and growing congregations. In a remote part of the diocese, where

peace is still relatively young. I met converted warriors and cattle rustlers - men who have now traded AK47s for a Bible and a gospel mission. The minister in this parish has already planted some 15 congregations throughout this formerly wild and dangerous area. These fellow Ugandan Christians would certainly say amen to Paul's words in Romans 1:

I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God for salvation of everyone who believes ... for in the gospel a righteousness from God is revealed, a righteousness that is by faith from first to last, just as it is written: "The righteous will live by faith".

Friends, it was such an encouragement to see God's mighty work in another part of his world. I returned conscious of my lack of zeal for the gospel; determined under God, and in his strength, to press on with sharing the good news of Jesus to the people of the North West and beyond.

Wayne Sutton is retiring at the end of December after 19 years as Registrar of the Diocese of North West Australia.


In 1994 Wayne, Gladys and their children Kelly and Peter were living in Dampier, working in administration for Hamersley Iron. They were also active members of their local Anglican church.

They saw an advertisement for the position in the Diocesan Office, applied, and Wayne was appointed Registrar on 15th December, 1994. God wonderfully provided a house in Geraldton, confirming their decision to make such a move.

When Wayne began Tony Nichols was Bishop, followed by David Mulready and then 18 months ago Gary Nelson. He also remembers Bishops Howell Witt and Ged Muston; all of them held in high esteem.

The Diocese has been blessed to have Joanne Klein in the Office all those years while more recently Carolyn Wilding (assistant to the registrar), and Jenny Stubbs (Archivist) – a great team.

Wayne has overseen many changes in the Office and Diocesan administration:





from a golf ball typewriter to an integrated computer system; from manual clergy payroll to a fully computerised package; from individual Insurance Policies to National Insurance, saving \$200,000 in 10 years; from 23 Diocesan Staff to 43; along with the introduction of a solar power scheme and an investment portfolio saving parishes \$75,000 pa.

The greatest challenge has been keeping up to date on matters such as investments, real estate, church law, parish/diocesan administration and Synod (both Diocesan and General).

His most rewarding accomplishments have been in assisting parishes with their administration and bringing the Diocesan Office into the 21st century. Wayne has also developed a not so obvious pastoral role amongst fellow Registrars.

Particular highlights were the building of the Hummerston Centre and the two residences on Carson

Terrace; as well as, the bi-annual Fellow Workers' Conferences.


